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I need to share a frightening secret with you. In ours, one of the world's richest nations, 23% of all adult Americans are illiterate.

It Isn't Right

Whether you are immediately appalled, or not, by this shocking statistic I suggest that you examine the scope of this **horrendous societal inequity,** as we at Literacy Volunteers of Eastern Orange County, Inc., along with the other affiliates in our state, and nation, struggle to meet this crisis. **We must have your attention and your help!**

In Newburgh, the situation is far more critical: **one third of all adults cannot read** their child's report card or the instructions on a prescription bottle or the names printed on an election ballot. They come from every generation and from every ethnic group. They are both native-born and immigrants.

To hide their humiliating secret, they wear reading glasses they don't need, carry pens they cannot use, and clutch unread newspapers like a shield.

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LVeoc Selected as a special Study Group in Dollar General / ProLiteracy Performance Accountability Initiative

In June LVeoc was chosen to be one of the Dollar General/ ProLiteracy Performance Accountability Initiative's "study groups". Over the next three years as LVeoc completes its structural reorganization we will document and report our changes/improvements as we implement them. In exchange for our maintaining meticulous documentation, Dollar General and ProLiteracy have granted a stipend of \$4,500 dollars!

In our role as a study group we will discuss and decide upon several key programmatic changes we have learned that will

improve the program. First, we are changing the way we document tutor/student meetings and other events like exits, vacations, leaves, etc. We will begin by adding a "happenings chart" to everyone's folder. That way we can see who is coming and who goes – and why – all at-a-glance, which will reduce paper usage while we improve our tracking system.

Another new policy prompted by the Dollar General/Pro Literacy initiative is our shift to **TABE** testing for students of Basic English. The TABE test serves the same purpose as the **READ** test did previously but TABE is more thorough and accurate. It is also easier to track and produce more accurate National Reporting System and other reports on our ALIES system which is the data recording process so key for much of our funding.
